Senior Studies at MacKillop





The Senior School

The Senior School provides study pathways for students planning careers and tertiary study. The College offers a rich curriculum catering to the diverse needs of senior students. All curriculum development and assessment occurs under the auspices of the Board of Senior Secondary Studies (BSSS). The strong pastoral signature of the Middle School and Bridging School are maintained in the senior school. The staff and facilities available provide students with excellent opportunities for academic achievement and personal growth and development.

Subjects and Courses

In Years 11 and 12, students can choose from a wide variety of Tertiary (T), Accredited (A), Vocational (V), Modified (M), and Higher Education (H) courses. Only T and H courses qualify students for an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR). Students need to study a minimum of **five courses across Years 11 and 12**. At the completion of Year 12, students who meet requirements are awarded a Senior Secondary Certificate, which records the work completed for Years 11 and 12 and the level of achievement in each unit of study. The Senior Secondary Certificate is issued by the BSSS.

Curriculum Mission Statement

The curriculum at St Mary MacKillop College is undertaken in an environment where each person is valued and respected as an individual whose personal growth is of paramount importance.

The curriculum provides excellence in education by:

- Teaching and fostering Catholic ideals.
- Ensuring that learning is relevant, rigorous, inclusive and accessible for all.
- Developing the skills and desire for individual life-long learning.
- Building 21st Century learners who value innovation, with developed skills in collaboration, communication, critical thinking and creativity.
- Empowering students to take responsibility for their decisions.
- Building students' confidence and self-esteem through success.
- Enabling students to understand how they learn.
- Emphasising the development of spiritual, intellectual, emotional, physical and creative capacities.

Our staff fulfill the role of teacher, mentor, carer, guide and challenger. They help to motivate students and develop in them a love of learning.

The Tertiary (ATAR) Package

Students wishing to enrol at university must complete a tertiary package and sit the ACT Scaling Test (AST) to gain an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR). To undertake a tertiary package, MacKillop requires students to study **at least five tertiary courses** in Year 11. The remaining course could be either a tertiary or accredited course. Tertiary courses are academically demanding and are designed to prepare students for university entrance, CIT, TAFE and other providers. To be eligible for the AST, students must complete at least 20 units over a minimum of four semesters and not exceeding five years. Upon the successful completion of a tertiary package, students will receive a Senior Secondary Certificate and a Tertiary Entrance Statement, which also provides the student with their ATAR.

The Accredited (Non-ATAR) Package

Students undertaking an accredited package may study a range of courses, and are not eligible for an ATAR. Accredited courses prepare students for study at CIT, TAFE and other providers, and are designed to deliver a general senior education. Upon the successful completion of an accredited package, students will receive a Senior Secondary Certificate.

Academic Support

The College is committed to providing academic support on the Senior Campus to assist students. In order to assist students with their studies, specialist teachers occupy the Learning Commons space. In addition, a range of additional tutorials are conducted by staff on a regular basis with additional support at peak assessment times. The Learning Commons is open before and after school to provide research support and access to information and IT facilities.

Students meet with their class teachers, who provide individual help with class work, assignments, and building content knowledge and skills. This learning structure is a high accountability learning model where students take responsibility for their learning. This is great training in independence for the world of work and university.

All senior students who are seeking university entrance are required to participate in the targeted AST program aimed at preparing them for the Writing Task, Short Answer Response and Multiple Choice components of the AST. Attendance at all sessions is mandatory and has played a significant role in ensuring our students are fully prepared for the AST.

The new Academic Resource Centre gives students easy access to key staff and has provided additional study spaces, meeting and collaboration rooms, and a new cafeteria.

Vocational Education

MacKillop offers a broad range of vocational courses that equip students for the workforce, and/or further training. Generally, vocational courses are hands on and practically based.

In addition to the Vocational subjects, Australian School-based Apprenticeships (ASBA) are available. Historically, MacKillop students have been involved in industry areas of Automotive, Building and Construction, Hairdressing, Hospitality, Community Pharmacy, Aged Care, Spray Painting & Panel Beating, Landscaping, Plumbing, Electro Technology and Business. Students who undertake vocational studies may participate in work placements and may qualify to receive a nationally recognised certificate.

Vocational courses lead to nationally recognised training certificates and direct employment. They also prepare students for CIT, TAFE, and (depending on the unit) university. Vocational courses can provide students with credit for further study, which can reduce the duration of study at CIT/TAFE.





There are 14 different Vocational Certificates available to MacKillop students in a wide range of courses.



MacKillop presented 91 Vocational Certificates and 81 Statements of Attainment to the Class of 2022.



The Trades Training Centre provides Hospitality and Construction students with modern, industrystandard facilities.

Ruby Mitchell Class of 2022

For Ruby Mitchell, MacKillop's Trades Training Centre and ASBA program opened up options in a range of pursuits.

"I'm really happy with what I was able to study within vocational education at MacKillop in the senior years. I was able to gain industry experience through my Australian School-Based Apprenticeship, which I took part in one day per week. It was a Women in Construction pathways program that enabled me to do electrical, carpentry, project management, landscaping, and plumbing. At school, I took courses in Construction and Hospitality through the College's Trades Training Centre to gain vocational certificates and qualifications.

Now that I've left school, I'm doing a full-time carpentry apprenticeship and I'd love to build my own home one day. The vocational pathway at MacKillop gave me lots of options and opportunities, and it has also given me a head start in my career."

The teachers of our senior courses are specialists in their fields - many of them have industry experience or extensive academic background in the subjects they teach. You'll study Science under the guidance of teachers with PhDs, learn how to cook from former chefs, have your PE lessons run by elite athletes, take Literature with published authors, learn from qualified lawyers in Legal Studies, and you'll be taught Tech subjects by former architects, engineers, and builders.

Success in all its forms is celebrated at the College. Academic Achievement

James Crispin College Dux, 2018

During Years 11 and 12, James took on a challenging academic program, which included subjects like Specialist Mathematics, Physics, and Chemistry. After finishing as College Dux, James' ATAR of 99.90 enabled him to study Medicine at Monash University, where he is currently completing his Honours year.

"We had a number of success stories from my year group – some of my friends went on to study things like Engineering, Veterinary Science, Actuarial Studies, Law, and Physiotherapy. The relationship I had with my teachers was incredibly critical to my success. They were invested in me, checked up on me regularly, and cared about my academic success and me as a person. I put in lots of hard work but the AST results of our year group also made a difference. The AST program at MacKillop definitely helped our year group to do so well. Huge thank you to my teachers who helped and supported me, and to my friends who competed with me and motivated me to do my best. I was incredibly happy with my results!"



Opportunities and Co-Curricular Activities



Each student at MacKillop has the opportunity to become the kind of person they want to be – it's our job to give them the best platform to achieve this.

While most opportunities are provided by the classroom experience, MacKillop considers education to be broader than just a sound curriculum. Together with parents, we strive to provide a balanced education that not only prepares students academically but also physically, socially and spiritually.

Supporting the formal curriculum, the College provides a range of co-curricular opportunities for students to further explore their interests and talents. Since co-curricular activities are usually conducted out of normal school hours, students are able to work with their peers in a less formal environment. These valuable opportunities are made possible by the generous support of teachers, parents, and friends of the College.

The College has a long tradition of involvement in sports, debating, public speaking, musicals, Duke of Edinburgh Award Program, Astronomy Club, liturgy, camps, retreats and youth ministry.

College Services

The College provides a number of services for its senior students. Students are given assistance with career decision-making, including work placement, throughout Years 11 and 12. The College has staff to assist students and parents with career advice. Advice on all aspects of course selection, university pre-requisites, tertiary training requirements and specialist career decisions is available from the Careers and Vocational Education Coordinator and the Senior Studies Coordinator. The College also holds an annual Careers Expo for its students to meet with universities, CIT, employer groups, apprenticeship centres, and industry groups. Students are able to speak to representatives from these organisations to gain valuable first hand information about career opportunities.

A number of programs are also available to students in Years 11 and 12. Year 11 students undertake a Senior Study Program, which aims to build students' study skills, together with skills in managing their mental health over the course of their senior studies. Tertiary students in both year groups participate in the AST Program. Year 12 students are able to act as mentors for students on the junior campus through the Cross-Campus Program.

Course advice and counselling are available to students in the lead up to Years 11 and 12, as well as throughout the senior years. Teachers and assistants provide specialist support for students requiring assistance with basic skills, study skills and learning skills. Students with special needs may receive in-class support, as needed.

Conferences and Seminars

Students are able to attend events to learn about or contribute to a range of topics, such as: leadership, sustainability and the environment, sport, careers, personal development, teamwork, law, the arts, and science.

Performing Arts

The College performs a musical each year and has a proud history of critical acclaim. Students are also able to perform dance, music, drama, or comedy pieces at assemblies, special events, concerts, Variety Night, and in competitions. Students are able to learn musical instruments through the In-School Instrument Tuition Program. There are band programs, dance groups, drama clubs, and student choirs. In recent years, the Choir qualified for the grand final of the Australian A Cappella Championships, our ensembles have enjoyed lots of success in a range of competitions, and the College gained a regular spot at the Canberra Comedy Festival.





Extension Programs and Competitions

Programs such as the Duke of Edinburgh Award, Science and Engineering Challenge, Tournament of the Minds, RoboCup, ANU STEM Program, ANU Titration Competition, National Mathematics and Science Competitions, Debating, and a range of clubs at the College offer opportunities for extension and for exploring new interests.

The College works with external agencies to enable talented or high performing students to study concurrently with each institution while at school. Two of these programs are the ANU Extension Program and the UC Accelerated Pathways Program. These courses are designated H courses and the score can be used in the calculation of the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR).

The College also offers a number of Registered Units for students in Years 11 and 12, which provides them with a chance to gain points toward their Senior Secondary Certificate and take part in co-curricular activities.





The Sport Program

Students enjoy participating in competitive and social sports including swimming, cross country, athletics, netball, softball, basketball, squash, cricket, tennis, hockey, beach volleyball, and the various codes of football. The College competes in carnivals and events organised by the Associated Southern Colleges and School Sport ACT. We have a proud history of success in these competitions. MacKillop students are also given the opportunity to participate in fencing and judo outside of school hours.

Elite athletes in Years 11 and 12 can focus on their chosen sport through the Sports Development course, which is part of the PE Pathways program. These are aimed at the development and support of elite athletes. Many students at MacKillop have gone on to participate in their sport at the highest level. Since the College does not field sporting teams on the weekend, students are free to represent their club.

"The sporting culture at MacKillop is really big, inclusive, and fun and this only gets better in the senior years with lots of opportunities to take more ownership and to get involved!

Our carnivals are huge community days and our school teams participate in gala days, which give students the chance to test their skills, play with friends, try new sports, and have fun. We often do really well in those competitions!

As a senior student, we have interesting PE subjects like Exercise Science, Health & Wellbeing, and Sport & Rec.

Elite athletes can take part in the PE Pathways/Sports Development Program, which is a specialised program to help you develop in your chosen sport. You can do strength training, plyometrics, fitness, recovery, skill building or you can use the lessons to focus on study given the training load most athletes have outside of school. The teachers have a lot of expertise and are committed to helping you achieve your sporting goals."



Exchange Programs and Study Tours

MacKillop students have the opportunity to visit the College's sister schools in Italy, France, and Japan, and are able to host students from these countries. The College also sends study tours to locations around the world, including New Zealand, the United States, South-East Asia, and other locations in Australia.



Camps and Retreats

Camps and retreats provide invaluable opportunities for students to associate with each other and with staff in an informal learning environment. These activities also allow students to further explore areas of their development such as teamwork and personal faith.



Leadership

Formal leadership opportunities exist for students on the Student Representative Council with additional opportunities for students in Year 12. Students participate in the leadership of the College, a particular portfolio, or one of the Houses. The SRC oversees our Outreach Program that fundraises for local and national charities and organises events for students, including fundraisers, fashion parades and Variety Night.



Opportunities for Year 12

As leaders of the school, Year 12 students are provided with a range of opportunities exclusive to the Graduating Class. These opportunities include: visiting students at the Padua Campus through the Cross-Campus Program, participating in group fundraising events like the Relay for Life, running the St Vincent de Paul Night Patrol, creating the College's Annual Magazine, and taking part in graduation events.

The College Community

Community Culture

The community culture is highlighted by senior students as an important aspect of Years 11 and 12 at MacKillop. Senior students are responsible for leading the College community and generating the vibe and energy that students at MacKillop have come to know and love. The students of Year 12 in particular play a big role in the organisation and running of school events.

MacKillop's community extends much further than the confines of the school. The College connects with local primary schools, charities, the universities, sporting groups, retirement villages, and other external agencies, providing students with opportunity and the chance to make connections in the wider community.

Celebrations and Events

Community events at MacKillop add to the College's dynamism. The College holds a number of community events, such as MacKillop Day, sporting carnivals, charity events, year group gatherings/meals, masses, mentoring events, liturgies, assemblies, social events, information sessions, and special graduation events for Year 12. These events add richness to the community, and, in turn, the experience of the student.

MacKillop regularly celebrates the achievement of its students in a range of pursuits. This helps students to become motivated, proactive, contributing members of the community.







Pastoral Care

Pastoral care is an important aspect of the College. Every student is valued as a unique individual. Pastoral care encompasses a commitment to the spiritual, physical, emotional and mental wellbeing of all students. It underpins what happens in each class and the interactions between all members of the College community. Students are nurtured and supported within a safe environment. Pastoral care is critical to enhancing academic outcomes, supporting students in their journey into adulthood and assisting in their personal development so that they may reach their full potential.

Our pastoral structures provide quality learning experiences, leadership, and mentoring opportunities that are centred on building relationships of trust and respect between all members of our College community.

Programs and Support

The Pastoral Program at MacKillop is a key aspect of the pastoral care and wellbeing of students. The content covers important elements of welfare and the healthy development of adolescents and young adults, complementing and enriching the formal curriculum. Themes of Pastoral Program include: Study Skills and Organisation, Safe Behaviours and Wellbeing, Relationships, and Community Service/Leadership.



Other specialised programs are also run from time to time, in addition to the extra-curricular life of the College, that support and enhance the development and wellbeing of students with their specific needs. The College also provides counselling services to all students and families. A Defence Force Transition Mentor and a Mentor for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students are both available.

Retreat Program

Retreats are integral to community building and faith formation at St Mary MacKillop College. They are prepared and run by the Pastoral Team responsible for each year group. The Year 11 Retreat occurs in Term 1 or 2. Physical, creative, liturgical and reflective activities are provided to enable students to see themselves as part of the community and their responsibilities within the community. The Year 12 Retreat occurs in Term 3 and its focus is on the transition from school to beyond. It also engages students through a program of activity, creativity, liturgy and reflection.

Links between home and College

St Mary MacKillop College recognises that parents/carers are the primary educators of their children and aims to work in partnership with them.

A number of formal and informal opportunities exist at St Mary MacKillop College to assist teachers and parents/ carers to work together in the education and wellbeing of their children. Parents/carers are always welcome at College and campus functions such as liturgies, assemblies and information evenings. Communication between College and home is also of high importance. Through publications such as newsletters, mail-outs, and the College website, the College is able to inform families of College news, upcoming events, important information and relevant issues. Staff can be accessed easily via phone or email. Parents/carers are able to log into Canvas to keep up-to-date with their child's assignments and assessment.

Formal progress interviews involving student, parents/ carers and subject teachers are conducted at the beginning of Terms 2 and 4. At the end of each semester, a formal report for each student is shared with families. This report provides an overview of student achievement and progress throughout the semester.

Student Experiences

Frequently Asked Questions

Mr Lee answers your questions about years 11+12



QUESTION: I'm already a MacKillop student. What changes can I expect in Years 11 and 12?

ANSWER: The biggest change you will notice is the much stronger relationships with your teachers, which will be more supportive, frequent, and individual. The senior years at MacKillop offer students a level of independence, freedom, ownership, and responsibility. Students have more choice with their subjects, which typically advances their enjoyment, dedication, and achievement in the classroom. Each year, the graduating class is most praiseworthy of the strong sense of community and its sustaining nature upon each of them. Here at MacKillop, they are extremely positive about the relationships of mutual respect they enjoy with their teachers and they appreciate the independence afforded to them by the school.

QUESTION: I'm going to be new to the College. Will I be welcome?

ANSWER: MacKillop prides itself on being a Catholic school for all. The faith tradition of your family will be respected and honoured. The College welcomes many new students into Year 11 and they quickly become active and contributing members of the community. MacKillop respects the contribution each student can make to building an inclusive, welcoming community that promotes personal growth, student achievement and relationships of integrity, affirmation and mutual respect.

QUESTION: What if I'm thinking of a different Year 11 and 12 environment?

ANSWER: It is true that in the ACT many students consider a change of learning environment for their final years. Some students choose to leave MacKillop at the end of Year 10, but a growing number of students come to MacKillop for Years 11 and 12. The advantage of staying on is that you are known, and you know us. At MacKillop, you can expect high academic achievement, the capacity to welcome new people and the chance to complete your final years with your peers and friends.

QUESTION: Where can I find more information about courses?

ANSWER: The Senior Handbook provides all the information students need to know about assessment, courses, AST, ATARs, and senior studies at MacKillop. It is available in the Publications Section on the College website, www.mackillop.act.edu.au. For existing MacKillop students, a series of presentations and interviews will take place to help you select the right subjects. Students can also consult with the Senior Studies Coordinator, Faculty Coordinators, or the Assistant Principal Academic Care. New students to the College will be invited to meet with curriculum staff, who will guide them through subject selection.

QUESTION: What if I'm good at sport?

ANSWER: MacKillop has a proud tradition of providing elite athletes with a solid platform to achieve their goals on and off the field. MacKillop understands that athletes spend many hours out of school training and competing. The College works with clubs and elite sporting agencies to develop the athlete whilst providing them with support and an academic program that presents them with many options for the future. The PE Pathways Program and Sports Development course, led by staff who have vast experience at an elite level, is the most recent initiative to help students create a pathway in their chosen sport.

QUESTION: What does the ATAR median really tell us about student and school performance?

ANSWER: The ATAR median is the middle mark achieved by the graduating class of each of the ACT college cohorts who pursued a tertiary package. The median is only one measure of the success of a school and can be skewed through the profile of the cohort – socioeconomic background of the school, restrictive enrolment practices, fees, and subject availability. At MacKillop, our median is almost always among the highest in Catholic education and in the local area. MacKillop students who pursue a tertiary package regularly achieve among the highest ATARs in the ACT and, importantly, are allowed to pursue a tertiary package even though their expectations of a high ATAR might be limited. A number of students gain access to university in courses that have cutoff entry scores below the median and MacKillop believes their post school options should not be restricted because of the impact of their likely ATAR on MacKillop's median. MacKillop students regularly achieve higher ATARs than they anticipated because of the quality of their senior experience and the culture of achievement that each of them contribute to at MacKillop.

It should also be remembered that students at MacKillop regularly achieve among the highest number of VET Certificates of the ACT Colleges and go on to have successful careers in a variety of industries, having received a first class head start in MacKillop's wide variety of industry courses.



The St Peter's Campus. Isabella Plains

The first thing you'll notice about the St Peter's Campus is how open it is, with blocks of classrooms linked by courtyards and external walkways. The open feel of the campus suits the older students – more freedom, more trust, and more responsibility.

The St Peter's Campus, formerly the home of St Peter's Catholic College, accommodates students in Years 10, 11 and 12. It is still sometimes known informally as 'The Isabella Campus' or 'The Senior Campus'.

Facilities

Specialist facilities on the Isabella Campus include a STEM laboratory, three commercial kitchens, textile and art rooms, brand new science laboratories, industrial technology/engineering workshops, gymnasium, strength and conditioning rooms, basketball courts, oval, drama and dance rooms, photography studio and dark room, music rooms with a recording studio, the Learning Commons Library, and the Trades Training Centre.

The Trades Training Centre's industrial kitchens and construction hangar allow students to work towards Vocational Certificates in the fields of Hospitality and Construction while they complete their Senior Secondary Certificate. Many other VET Certificates are available through the range of courses offered by MacKillop in Years 11 and 12.

In recent years, the College opened its Academic Resource Centre, which gives students easy access to key senior studies staff and provides additional study spaces, a presentation theatre, meeting and collaboration rooms, and a new cafeteria. MacKillop also refurbished the B and C classroom blocks to bring them up to standard with the general purpose classroom facilities on campus.

In 2023, the College will begin construction on a new Performing Arts Centre.
