

Self-Reflection

In recent weeks students in Years 7 to 10 in Student Mentoring lessons have:

- reflected on their academic achievement this term
- assessed their progress towards achieving goals
- considered how they might maintain motivation for the remainder of the year.

The purpose of the session has been to assist students; in remaining focused on their studies, achieving to their potential and accomplishing goals they have set for themselves.

Parents are encouraged to engage with their son/daughters progress by checking:

- the Semester 2 Assessment planner (page 74 and 75 in the Student Diary)
- goals set for Semester 2 and if these are on track to be achieved (page 76 of the Student Diary)
- The Term 3 self-reflection (students have been asked to submit this on Canvas so that parents can view it)

Summer Uniform

A reminder that from the beginning of Term 4 all students are to wear the Summer Uniform.

- For boys this means that tailored mid-grey school shorts are an option in addition to the trousers. Grey or black socks may be worn with the trousers, however if shorts are worn the socks must be grey.
- Girls in Years 7 to 10 may wear the teal check summer dress with plain short white socks, or the tailored navy slacks with MacKillop monogram and a white over-blouse with MacKillop monogram.
- Any holiday 'variations' such as facial piercings or fashionable extremes to hair such as colours or styles should be rectified before returning to school for the new term.
- School shoes are to be traditional, lace up, black and polishable

More detailed information is available in the Student Diary, on the College website and on Canvas. If there are circumstances that prevent students from wearing the correct uniform, they are required to bring a signed note from their parents to explain the situation. They need to present this to their Pastoral Care Coordinator during PC time each morning to obtain a uniform pass.



Padua Campus Mobile Phone Procedures

The College policy on mobile phones at the Padua Campus is that no students are to use mobile phones at school, from their time of arrival until 3.15pm.

If mobile phones are sighted by staff, they are confiscated and stored securely at the front office. They may be collected at the end of the school day on the first or second occasion. In these situations, an email will be sent to parents informing them of the incident. If a student's phone or mobile device is confiscated on a third, or further occasions in a year, parents will be contacted by a Pastoral Care Coordinator. The phone will remain secured at the Front Office and will either be:

- · stored at the College until it is collected by a parent, OR
- returned to the student once an after school detention has been agreed to and scheduled.

If there is a pressing issue requiring a student to use a phone they may do so at Student Reception or their Pastoral Care Coordinator's Office. Parents may also get in contact with their son or daughter during the school day by contacting Student Reception All students have been reminded of the policy and procedures at recent Year Assemblies this week. The options available to students, should they need to use their phone or other mobile devices for a valid reason, have been reiterated.



Adolescent Mental Health & Wellbeing Connecting Parents with Mental Health

Also in attendance will be over 12 local wellbeing providers that will be able link parents and carers to agencies and or resources that can assist them in caring for their teenage daughters and sons in a supportive environment. Teaching & Learning



What is Design Tech?

Where would we be without Design or Technology? Design and Technology is responsible for everything in society. The application of design principles, and the use of technology has allowed the world to evolve and exist as it does today. Design and Technology plays a role in all facets of our lives. From the design and manufacturing of computers and other basic products, to the use of modern technology that allows doctors and surgeons to perform ground breaking medical procedures.

All the activities grouped under the Design and Technology Key Learning Area do, however, share a common impetus and a number of features. The common theme being **problem solving activities**. Ones that require students to identify a problem, establish a solution and then work towards achieving that solution. Improving an electronic circuit, designing and creating a piece of furniture or producing preliminary sketches or drawings for a specific task all have problem solving in common.







The Purpose of Design & Technology

Students need to be able to think about what they are trying to achieve in solving problems, so that they can learn to judge both their own and other student's solutions in a reasoned way. Since there would be no point in changing something if it made it function or look worse it is obvious that the purpose of Design and Technology is to make things work and look better. Eg. If a car was produced that was safer, quicker, stronger, cheaper, lighter and more economical than existing models, we would agree that it was a better car. However, in practice we would probably find that many of the design requirements in this example conflicted with each other, such as, speed might conflict with economy or strength with safety. Therefore, the application of Design and Technology is one of compromise, and new designs do not have to be entirely different to be successful.

When people in society develop an understanding of about Design and Technology and are well-informed about issues that affect their livelihood it results in a more functional and effective society. Our understanding of Design and Technology and our experiences will help us all to do this. In the same way it will assist us to make decisions about choosing things. Deciding what dining table to purchase, for example, can involve the same careful and objective study of functional and aesthetic aspects of table design as is involved in designing one to fit another situation. Therefore, understanding Design and Technology is a valuable introduction to making decisions and solving problems in a wide range of situations that students might find themselves confronted with later in life.

Teaching & Learning



Science Excursions

In the past fortnight both Chemistry and Human Biology students from the St Peter's campus have participated in excursions to see demonstrations not possible in school. The Chemistry students, like their Padua counterparts, were amazed by the explosions and hands-on Chemistry of Professor Wother's Period Table show at ANU. The Human Biology students braved an early start and travelled to the Museum of Human Diseases at UNSW, Sydney. At the museum, students participated in presentations looking at the lifestyle factors that contribute to particular diseases and worked through hands-on activities looking at the role of genetics in disease. Students also had the opportunity to view the large collection of human tissue samples held at the museum. Each tissue sample had been taken from a person who was afflicted by a particular disease. Students were fascinated (and a little shocked) by what can happen to the human body and appreciated the opportunity to see for themselves the components of the body systems that they have studied throughout the year.



ANCQ Results

The Australian National Chemistry Quiz (ANCQ) is an Australian-based competition that attracts students in 23 countries across Oceania, Asia and Europe. The quiz requires students to apply their chemical knowledge and understanding to solve problems related to provided stimulus materials.



Helping your child avoid being cyberbullied

Cyberbullying of children and teenagers is one of the greatest fears facing parents today. The thought of their child being subjected to heinous words, threats to their physical safety, as well as their social and emotional wellbeing, is something no parent wants their child to experience.

Most of the bullying behaviours we now see are happening from behind a keyboard, playing out in social media feeds and gaming chat rooms. It is little wonder parents feel overwhelmed and out of their depth, especially when for most, online is an environment that is relatively unfamiliar.

So what can we do to help our kids avoid these types of behaviours, as well as give them the skills to deal with cyberbullying behaviours should they be exposed?

- Remind them of all of the things they have control over: While it may not feel like it, we have a lot of
 control over what happens online. We can determine who we talk to, what we ignore, what we share, how we
 comment, who we follow, who we block or hide from our feeds. All of that, helps us determine who is allowed
 to play a role in our online experiences and ultimately what behaviours we accept on our feeds
- Give your child time away from the screens: Everyone needs a break from screens. We want to
 encourage regular times when a child doesn't need to be tethered to their device. Building a wider
 community away from the screens helps a child or teen build their sense of self worth. Keeping devices away
 from the dinner table also gives them a break from being socially switched on and allows the to connect with
 family without a device. Removing devices at night helps their active brains to switch off, and prepare for
 sleep.
- Role play possible responses: Discuss with your child whether whether they should respond to bullying
 or nasty online comments, If they do, then consider how they could respond. Consider the statements or
 types of people they ignore, block or report.
- Regularly check the privacy settings: Every app, game and social network has a settings button that
 enables you to determine how positive an experience your child can have on that platform and how much
 control they have. Visit these settings regularly to look at the options available

While nothing is guaranteed particularly when it comes to the online world, we can certainly be taking steps to help our kids. We can give them skills, encourage positive behaviours and thinking that allow them to minimise their exposure to the bullying behaviours of others.
