

Dear Parents, Teachers and Students

Greetings from Institution St Joseph, lycée Catholiques, Le Havre, France! This school has been a partner of MacKillop's for eight years. This community has welcomed several hundred of our students into its classrooms and homes forging friendship, understanding and expert language experiences. Today, I have been privileged to teach an English class to Year 9 on the novel To Kill A Mockingbird. There is a reason I no longer teach but it was fun for the students and not so terrifying for me-after a while. There are many students at this school who wish to visit MacKillop and I have been moved by the process the students undergo for selection; interviews, projects and speeches. The feedback I have received from the students and their teachers has been so positive about MacKillop and the generosity of our families. Thank you to everybody at MacKillop for your participation in this project, the rewards are so worth it.

Prior to visiting France I travelled with MacKillop students and staff to Greece and Italy, the highlight being the week long home stay experience at out sister school in Padua. This also has been overwhelmingly positive as a source of feedback about our program and school.

Overseas travel is not a glamorous experience and group travel can create inconveniences. This was the case on this trip. At no time did any of the adults on the trip hear one word of complaint, experience any lack of cooperation or have to deal with any poor choices made by students. This is not about luck. It is very easy to be proud of our kids and important to not take their character and substance for granted.


Teaching & Learning



Languages

Languages is a significant part of the curriculum at St Mary MacKillop College. And Italian, French and Japanese are offered from Years Seven to Twelve. Students have the opportunity to study a language in Years Seven and Eight and then they can build on this by choosing a language as an elective in Years Nine to Twelve. The senior school offers Languages at a Beginning and Continuing level. This gives students who have only done a language in Years Seven and Eight to pick up a language in Year Eleven as a Beginning Course.

In many other countries, learning a language is compulsory until the final year of schooling. In contrast, Australian students may study a language other than English in secondary school but few actually continue language study once they are able to tailor their subject choices in their senior years. I would like to take a brief look at the benefits of studying languages at school.



It broadens their horizons: Language study will not only provide your child with the skills to speak, write and read a foreign language, but will typically also give insight into the history and culture of societies where the language is used.

It can provide opportunities for international travel: Learning a second language can offer students a number of opportunities for international study.

It can boost their chances of tertiary entrance: Many universities recognise the benefits of language study and are willing to offer students 'bonus points' for studying a language during school.

It can improve job prospects down the track: It's no secret that speaking a foreign language can be beneficial when it comes time to find a job. Employers in service industries such as tourism and hospitality will favour those who speak a second language. The same can be said for businesses that deal with overseas clients and partners on a regular basis, as well as job roles that require overseas travel. Having the ability to communicate in another language will put your son or daughter in demand in the employment market



There are links to intellectual and physiological benefits: Many studies have been conducted into the benefits of learning a second language, with research linking bilingualism to literacy development and improved cognitive skills such as memory, perception and the ability to multi-task. It has also been found that learning a second language can help improve the development of skills in an individual's first language.

At St Mary MacKillop we have a number of skilled Language Teachers who are passionate about encouraging students to learn a foreign language. The language programme is well supported by Cultural Studies classes. Sandhya Tulpule, Hayley Feilding and Sandy Duncan have developed some excellent programmes to engage students in cultural awareness and appreciation. A number of students have just returned from a History/ Language tour to Greece and Italy. This was an exciting opportunity for those students to directly engage in the cultures of their history and language studies. I would like to thank our colleagues at the Liceo Fermi in Padua for hosting us. I would also like to thank Peter Johnson for his excellent organisation and Michael Lee, Maria O'Donnell, Tara Williams, Lachlan McNicol for attending and looking after our students.

Promoting a leadership mindset in students

There are leaders in all walks of life. In business, at school, in families, in sport and in the wider community your young person will have the opportunity to lead others. Your young person may have many individual attributes that will enable them to lead but, to be truly successful, they also need to develop the appropriate mindset.

Put others first

Effective leaders generally act in the best interest of others. When a young person focuses on how they can work for the good of others he or she is well-placed to lead. You can develop a benefit mindset in the following ways:

- Encourage your young person to volunteer within the community
- Share your stories of community, leadership and volunteering
- Give your child leadership opportunities (with accompanying responsibilities) among siblings and friends

A willingness to step up

Situational leadership opportunities are everywhere such as leading a small group learning activity at school; coaching a local basketball team; and taking extra responsibility in a part-time job. Encourage your young person to accept responsibility, take initiative and claim ownership when things don't go to plan. Here's how:

- Discuss situational leadership with your young person
- Encourage initiative by giving them an opportunity to solve their own problems
- Help to identify environments where he or she feels comfortable taking a lead such as in class or on a sporting field

The ability to speak up

A young person with a leadership mindset is more likely to put aside self-doubts about speaking in front of others. Encourage your young person to speak in front of others by:

- Giving them opportunities to express their opinions at home
- Encouraging them to speak up in small group situations at sport or other after school activities
- Developing their skills through debating, acting or public speaking



An attitude of inclusiveness

Leaders can only be truly successful when they include others in their activities. Develop an attitude of inclusiveness by encouraging your young person to:

- Notice those around them who may not fit in or who are different in some way to the group norm
- Work with young people from different backgrounds and with different interests, at school and in the community
- Be involved in at least one activity outside school in an effort to broaden their social horizons

Leadership is as much about mindset as it is about skill development. When you encourage your young person to think **We** rather than **Me**, you'll be on the road to developing an invaluable leadership mindset that they can take into a variety of situations.
