

Creative Maths

Creative Maths has been an enriching and fun experience this term. We started off learning about logic and reasoning, where we were challenged with fun logic questions that tested our understanding and will. We then moved onto code breaking and encryption. We have learnt about a lot of interesting topics such as: modular arithmetic, matrices and online encryption. We also learnt about the World War 2 Enigma Machine and how it was broken by Alan Turing.

At the moment we are learning about Curve Stitching. Curve stitching is a form of string art where smooth curves are created through the use of straight lines. We created lots of cool and creative curve stitching patterns. To do this we hammered nails into a wooden board and using string we threaded them in a pattern. The wool may look curved but don't be fooled as all lines are straight.

Overall Creative Maths has been a fun, challenging experience which gave us a chance to expand our knowledge.

Science Opportunities

ASTRONOMY CLUB

For a few beautiful clear nights in term 3 the MacKillop Astronomy Club came back to school at night to share in the wonders of the sky. Club members delighted in using the telescopes to find planets, nebulas, and star clusters in the night sky. We even had a flyover visit from the ISS! In particular, close up views of the Great Red Spot of Jupiter and the rings of Saturn will sit happily in the memory until we can start up again next year.

ANSTO VIRTUAL EXCURSIONS

Both Year 11 and 12 physics students recently had the opportunity to engage in virtual excursions of ANSTO – Australia's nuclear science research centre. Students enjoyed a tour of the scientific methods used in many experiments that ANSTO conducts, including using their nuclear reactor to make medical isotopes used in hospitals across the country, high end silicon wafers used in bullet trains, and neutrons that are used to investigate the structure of biological compounds. Our students impressed the ANSTO staff with their insightful questions that kept the experts on their toes, and enjoyed a taste of the many career opportunities that their skills will prepare them for.

- Learning Commons staff are available to Year 11 and 12 students at the St Peter's Campus. This includes booking a time with the Learning Commons Teacher or the Teacher Librarian to discuss goal setting, time management, research and digital literacy skills, concepts and assessments tasks.
- A variety of specialist teachers from Mathematics, Science, English, Religious Education and HASS also play a vital role in the Learning Commons at the Senior Campus. These teachers are timetabled in the Learning Commons to assist students.

At the Junior Campus, students can see the Learning Commons Staff to help with their research skills, finding the right resources, note-taking and referencing.



Technology News





Design & Technologies and the design process

The learning area of the Technologies has changed considerably over the last five years. The introduction of the Australian Curriculum has seen an increased importance in working to produce design solutions.

WHAT EXACTLY IS A DESIGN SOLUTION?

Typical Design and Technologies processes and production concentrate on learning opportunities that require students to apply their knowledge and understanding in practical ways. The Design and Technologies processes and production skills strand of the Australian Curriculum focuses on learning where students create (through problem solving) designed solutions. This means that students must first think about the purpose of the project they are going to make and then create a design solution which meets this requirement.

TYPES OF DESIGNED SOLUTIONS EXPLAINED?

Students in all Design and Technologies subject specialities will have the opportunity to produce or manufacture a range of items or products using a variety of materials and resources.

Designed solutions are specified to give students opportunities to engage with both design thinking and production skills. For example, Year 7 students may apply a design process (systematic method to solve a problem) and produce an engineered product which can measure moisture - an electronic moisture tester. Students have to think about its purpose and how they want it to look. Using instructional assistance from their teachers, students create an electronic circuit in a timber housing. Using the same design process, Year 8 students may manufacture a timber storage stool with a specific purpose in mind, and in Year 10 Metal Engineering, students could design and fabricate a practical project from recycled metal items. In each of these examples students apply and practice production skills and problem solving to create what we refer to as a designed solution.

Pastoral Care



Summer Uniform

From the beginning of Term 4 all students are to be wearing the Summer Uniform. Detailed information is available in the Student Diary, on the College website and on Canvas. However, particular points to note include:

- Boys have the option to wear tailored mid-grey school shorts in addition to the trousers. Grey or black socks may be worn with the trousers, however if shorts are worn the socks must be grey.
- Girls in Years 7 to 10 may wear the teal check summer dress with plain short white socks, or the tailored navy slacks with MacKillop monogram and a white over-blouse with MacKillop monogram.
- Please be mindful that as stated in the Student Diary; "Girls skirts, dresses and shorts are to be knee length" (p. 13). It would be appreciated if any adjustments or new purchases are made as necessary to commence Term 4.
- Any holiday 'variations' such as facial piercings or fashionable extremes to hair such as colours or styles should be rectified before returning to school for the new term. In relation to hairstyles, the College policy states "extreme variations of length are not permitted". This means that any changes in length should be graded, tapered, layered, etc. Students should return to school ensuring any haircuts or styles are within the College policy.
- School shoes are to be traditional, lace up, black and polishable

If there are circumstances that prevent students from wearing the correct uniform, they are required to bring a signed note from their parents to explain the situation. They need to present this to their Pastoral Care Coordinator during PC time each morning to obtain a uniform pass.

Pathways

As a part of the Student Mentoring process in recent weeks, students in Years 7 to 12 have accessed a Pathways website that assists students to plan for their future, including career planning, and aims to support them in times of transition.

In light of the current economic circumstances in Australia, with the nation experiencing a recession for the first time in 28 years, the lesson was presented in a context for students where the implications for young people are that; less jobs are available, the current unemployment rate is 7.4 percent and expected to rise, there has been an increase in the rate of underemployment in Australia and accessing employment opportunities is highly competitive. The Pathways website provided an opportunity for students to consider how they are preparing to put themselves in the best possible position, in terms of skills, experience and credentials, to be successful in this competitive environment when seeking employment, be it post school, part-time or casual.

Help kids tap into their inner resources



My first parenting mentor, Maurice Balson, author of *Becoming Better Parents* constantly reminded parents, "If you want your child to be resourceful you need to put them in positions to develop their resources."

Balson's resourcefulness message is just as apt today. Coping with change, dealing with small losses, handling rejection and overcoming disappointment are the types of experiences that build a child's or young person's inner resources.

Developing resourcefulness is the appropriate approach to take when considering the disruptive impact that coronavirus is having on kids' lives. A child who is struggling to come to grips with the changes brought about by the pandemic initially needs an emphatic, supportive approach. They also need encouragement to tap into their inner resources to help them manage the hard times. The following strategies will help develop your child or young person's inner resources.

Give them a chance to be resourceful

Harry, age 10, often leaves his lunch at home. His father, who works from home, won't take forgotten items to school. Harry either misses lunch or persuades his friends to share their lunches with him. Either way, when Harry leaves his lunch at home he's forced to rely on his emotional or physical resourcefulness to get by. And he does.

Catch them being resourceful

A child's behaviours that gain a parent's attention generally expand. Highlight a child's good manners, acts of kindness or honesty and you're more likely to get a repeat of those behaviours. Positive parental recognition is a high motivator for most kids. To encourage your child's resourcefulness, focus your attention and positive comments on acts of resourcefulness and resilience they exhibit.

Encourage creativity

Sylvia, age 13 walked to school each day, saving her bus fare to spend on clothes that were out of reach of her parents' budget. Sylvia found a way to overcome her money problem in her own way. Children and young people usually come up with very creative solutions when they're allowed to own their problems.

Develop coping skills

Kids rely on their coping skills to help them manage their emotional states when life throws them curve balls. Build your child's set of coping skills through direct teaching, modelling and discussion. Humour, distraction, relaxation, exercise, play and thought-distancing are some of the more common coping skills kids can use to help them tolerate their difficult feelings.



The resourcefulness a child develops when they experience adversity doesn't desert them when life returns to normal. It waits in the background, ready to be drawn upon again when hardships, frustrations and difficulties come their way.
