St Mary MacKillop College enjoyed a positive start to Term 2 as students returned from the April school holidays on Wednesday.

Students started the day with an ANZAC Liturgy during Pastoral Care, before they returned to their classrooms freshly rejuvenated from their two-week break.

There were some noticeable changes on campus, with updates to COVID protocols meaning students were no longer required to wear masks indoors. An outline of the protocol updates was emailed to parents earlier this week.

Term 2 is one of the busiest stages of the College calendar, with Open Days, the Careers Expo, Try MacKillop Day, NAPLAN, the Cross Country, Urban Challenge, exams, camps, pastoral events, and reflection days all packed into the 10-week period. On top of these events, students are now able to return to school sport and other extra-curricular activities with the changes to COVID restrictions.

NAPLAN Testing 2022

The National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is annual assessment for **all students in Years 7 and 9**. It tests the types of skills that are essential for every student to progress through school and life. The tests cover skills in reading, writing, spelling, grammar and punctuation, and numeracy. As a College we value the NAPLAN testing for a variety of reasons. We are provided with detailed data about individual students and the respective cohorts which assist in informing teachers about areas of student strength and areas for development.

NAPLAN 2022 is scheduled to take place between **Tuesday 10 and Friday 13 May 2022** for our Year 7 and Year 9 students. All testing will occur using the online testing platform.

Student Equipment Requirements

- 1. A fully charged device (laptop computer).
- 2. Earphones (plug in earphones are preferred rather than wi-fi versions which may drop out over the course of the testing and provide interruption to student testing).
- 3. Writing equipment (pens, pencils eraser and sharpener).
- 4. Water bottle.

Please note that students are not to bring any mobile phones or digitally enabled watches into the testing classrooms. All students will be asked to remove their watches and place them in their pocket for the duration of the testing. All tests have a clock on them to assist students with time management.

If students are sick on the day of NAPLAN please keep them at home. They will be offered the opportunity to undertake catchup testing (depending on their return to school date). This year the Science Faculty is teaching two new electives - Forensic Science in Year 9 and Data Science in Year 10.

Forensic Science

Forensic Science is a multidisciplinary science that has gained popularity through media exposure including television shows such as CSI. Over the course of the semester, students will enhance their working knowledge and application of a number of scientific processes and research skills, including observing, making inferences, problem solving, drawing conclusions, organizing data, and measurements.

During Term 1, students conducted a number of experiments where they were required to collect and analyse physical evidence using the tools of a forensic scientist. Student highlights from the term include lifting fingerprints from various surfaces using different dusting powders, observing hair fibres under a microscope, analysing bite mark impressions and matching tyre track evidence.

Data Science

There is a huge amount of data in the world, and an understanding of this data can help to answer difficult questions about society. The Big Data in Science elective is designed to develop students' skills to effectively analyse and make sense of the results of large-scale scientific experiments. Students completing the elective have strong interests in science, programming and problem solving. Students have been given access to large sets of data looking at Stars, Climate, Chemical Elements and Motion, with highlights of generating their own Hertzsprung-Russell diagrams and working out the average temperature of all the yellow stars visible in the night sky.

In Term 2 student will be using their problem-solving skills and creativity to answer their own scientific questions by designing experiments using data loggers and large data sets, which they will share with a general audience.

Turntin - More than just a plagiarism checker


Turnitin is a text matching program that allows students to check their referencing, originality of expression, grammar, spelling and punctuation. When an assignment is uploaded through Turnitin, text within that assignment is compared with other texts online, in databases and within a repository of student assignments from around the world. From this, a similarity report is generated which highlights what percentage of the assignment matches or closely matches text found elsewhere. This percentage can be broken down to specific sources that the text originated from.

All students at MacKillop are **required to submit their written assignments to Turnitin via Canvas**. While this process is familiar to students across the College, many only use Turnitin to fulfil this requirement, not realising that this program is also a valuable learning tool that can be utilised to improve their research skills and the quality of written work.

Students are encouraged to utilise this valuable learning tool. If they have any questions they should talk with their teachers or the staff in the Learning Commons.

Upload your assignment prior to the due date through Turnitin and download the Similarity Report.



Use the Similarity Report to determine whether you have written information in your own words, used quotation marks for quotations and cited any ideas that are not your own. To learn more about the Similarity Report, read the guides here.



Access the e-rater feedback tool. This tool provides you with feedback about grammar, usage, mechanics, style and spelling errors. Utilising the feedback from this tool will assist you to improve the quality of your writing before submitting a final copy of your task. Standing behind difficult decisions



Johan and Harry were both suspended from school for a day after willingly watching a schoolyard fight. Their school had a zero-tolerance policy toward fighting and believed that those who watched a fight were as complicit in the conflict as those engaged in the fighting.

The reactions of both sets of parents to the boys' suspensions differed greatly. Johan's parents supported the school's actions and made the necessary changes to their work schedules to accommodate the suspension. Privately, they thought that the suspension may have been harsh, but as they agreed with the school's zero tolerance approach to violence, they knew they had no option but to accept the suspension. They counselled their son against similar behaviour in future and made sure his time away from school was spent doing schoolwork.

Harry's parents weren't quite so supportive. Thinking that their son's suspension was unfair, they contacted the school's principal asking to have the suspension removed. The principal listened to their concerns however she didn't remove the suspension. She reminded Harry's parents of the reasons behind the school's zero tolerance approach to fighting and urged them to support of their policy. Disappointed but obviously not deterred, Harry's father took time off work to take his son on a fishing trip on the day of the suspension. This action showed little regard for the school's efforts to encourage a culture of respectful relationships, as well as scant respect for the principal's authority.

Make the most of learning moments

Both sets of parents thought that the suspension of their sons was harsh. However, only one set saw the situation as a learning experience for the son. Johan's parents discussed with their son the place that bystanders play when violence breaks out. They reinforced the message that although it may take courage to stop a fight or bring it to the attention of teachers, it's these sorts of actions that constitute positive leadership.

Harry's parents couldn't see past the injustice of the suspension and missed a great opportunity to teach their son any number of lessons. These include what he may do next time a similar incident occurs, how he might respond when he sees someone being bullied or even how to nip conflict between peers in the bud before it escalates. There are many discussions they could have had with their son due to the suspension. From an educative perspective, this was an opportunity missed.

Trust the process

Arguably, the bigger issue in this story is that just as Johan's parents did, we parents need to trust the processes that teachers put in place at school, even when we don't always agree. Family-school partnerships are strongest when parents stand behind the difficult decisions that teachers make, even though the wisdom behind them may not be immediately evident. Sometimes, we all have to stand back and trust a process that's been in put in place, particularly when it's been implemented after a great deal of thought and diligence.
