### Vale Archbishop Francis Carroll

As many of you would be aware, former Archbishop, Francis Carroll, entered into eternal life last week. His was a good and rich life. I wrote a letter to the Canberra Times, which was published on Saturday (reproduced below). I represented the College at his funeral on Thursday 21 March.

*I read of the passing of Fr Francis Carroll with deep emotion. He gave dignity, respect, and time to everybody he met. He exhibited the best of integrity, wisdom, humanity, and faithfulness here in Canberra and everywhere in the archdiocese to which we belong. I have never met anybody who wasn't comforted and uplifted by his company. This remains perhaps his finest achievement. His passion for the Sydney Swans was perhaps his only flaw. May his memory be blessed.*

Creative Maths has proven to be a very pragmatic and useful subject for the Year 8s and they are loving the opportunities thus far.



## Geography Excursions

### Wollongong & Jerrabomberra Wetlands

Students in Year 11 and 12 Geography recently had the opportunity to participate in field trips to Bulli and Sandon Point beaches in Wollongong and the Jerrabomberra Wetlands as part of their study of land cover transformations. These excursions provided valuable hands-on learning experiences, allowing students to apply concepts from the classroom in practical settings.

During the field trip to Wollongong, students examined the complexities of managing land cover in a coastal environment. Students collected primary data and made detailed observations to gain a deeper understanding of the physical processes shaping our coastlines. A significant part of the excursion involved identifying and evaluating different management strategies to mitigate the impact of natural processes and human activity in the area.

The focus then shifted from the coast to the urban landscape of the Jerrabomberra wetlands, where students explored land cover management in response to surrounding development. Students heard from a senior ranger about the intrinsic values of the wetlands, the threats posed by human activity and management strategies that have been implemented to preserve this novel ecosystem. The excursion concluded with a macroinvertebrate sampling activity to assess the health of various water bodies across the wetlands.

Through these excursions, students have developed a deeper appreciation for coastal and wetland environments and the need for more sustainable management practices.

## Year 11 Chemistry *Gold Nanoparticles*

Year 11 Chemistry students recently made gold nanoparticles. Nanoparticles are materials that measure between 1 and 100 nanometres – one nanometre is one billionth of a metre. In comparison, a human hair is approximately 100000 nanometres wide. Gold nanoparticles appear red in colour, unlike bulk metallic gold, which is a lustrous yellow. Gold nanoparticles are used in a variety of fields from electronics to medicine. They are commonly used in lateral flow assays such as home pregnancy tests and Covid Rapid Antigen Tests.

## International Women's Day Breakfast

In Week 5, alongside Ms Kinnane and Mrs Lee, the Year 12 female captains attended the International Women's Day breakfast held at Ainslie Football Club by the Women's Catholic Taskforce of the Canberra and Goulburn Archdiocese. We left the breakfast not only with full stomachs of delicious fresh fruit and pastries, but also feeling inspired and empowered by the words of Selena Walker, the award winner of ACT local hero, as well as a respected Indigenous woman, and a member of our own MacKillop community.

She spoke to us about the importance of being ourselves, her passion for paving a pathway where everyone has a voice and how our nation needs to listen to our inspired younger generations as they will be leading our futures. Three concepts that Selena used to describe indigenous spirituality stood out to us. The first way she explained it was by describing it as an amputated leg and how, although the amputee could not see or physically touch the limb, they somehow always have a sensation of connection.

The second example she used, was saying that Indigenous people are like square pegs, in a white man's circle-shaped world. The square shape will never fit because they are so different. She continued to explain how 'during COVID-19 everyone had to change their ways of operating, making us have to be like triangles.' Her main message in this example was encouraging us to find a way to build a hexagon. This way a triangle, square and circle can all fit.

The final example she gave to us at breakfast was about a McDonald's drive-through. Everybody knows that there are usually two lanes you can choose from to order your food. She asked us to imagine that one lane was indigenous spirituality, and the other was not. They are both going towards the same destination, yet they are different. This is the way she described her spirituality, doing the same thing, just in a different way.

Selena's speech really resonated with me and my fellow captains, and we were honoured to hear her brilliant thoughts and stories. Listening to her speak inspired us, and encouraged us to strive for greatness, and live with kindness.
